ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

Annual Conference, June 4-7 `, was held in Peoria. Each church in the Illinois Great Rivers Conference can send one lay delegate for each assigned pastor. I again represented Otterbein. We, as a conference, conducted some necessary church business. And again, worship times were a highlight.

The conference was presided over by our Bishop, Jonathan D Keaton. Some of the necessary business that needed to be taken care of included approval of various reports and decisions on several issues presented for action. We decided on a Conference Budget, Pastors' Pension and Nominations to fill all the Conference committees. Unfortunately, we were asked to approve the closing of a few struggling churches in the Conference.

Extensive discussion centered on Pastors Health Insurance. It was decided rather than the local church paying \$17,500 for the pastor's health insurance, the church will pay the pastor \$12,000 for the pastor to purchase their own insurance (the best deal for their needs that they can find). This will save a local church \$5,200.

Otterbein will little be affected since we have a part-time, retired pastor who can get some assistance from the Preacher's Aid Society and Benefit Plan for health insurance needs

Church business, worship and fellowship are all part of Annual Conference. Pray that all these aspects are carried out at Otterbein, too.

LAY LEADER'S LINE

In my 35 year career with the Postal Service, it was a safe bet that I had been in contact with well over 100 million letters not counting magazines, newspapers, and packages. Over the past few years, the Postal Service has witnessed a sharp decline in letters being mailed, especially hand-written ones. As a people, we have forgotten just how precious a hand-written letter can be to the recipient. Ask a soldier, if he or she would rather receive an email or a hand written letter from their spouse. Ask the same question to a person in prison, a child away at camp, or a grandmother who lives a thousand miles away and I would venture to say that the vast majority would prefer a handwritten letter. Why, you ask? I would say that there is something special about reading from the actual hand writing of the person. The reader can visualize the writer as the words soothe their hearts. Often times there may be a fragrance on the paper or ink. The reader's experience is intensified far more than a cold email.


I read recently that a personal, 9-page letter written by Mark Twain to his daughter in 1875 sold for \$33,000.00 in 1991. Ordinary correspondence from the author of Tom Sawyer usually brings \$1,200.00 to \$1,500.00 a page. Experts say that even though Twain wrote 50,000 letters during his lifetime, demand is still the strongest for the personal notes. There is something special about these personal letters. I wonder if in generations to come, personal e-mails from this century will be as sought after as hand-written letters.

You probably don't have a letter from Mark Twain tucked away in a drawer, but each one of us own a priceless collection of letters. Twenty-one of the 27 books in the New Testament are letters written to encourage and instruct Christians. In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul wrote, "*Surely you have heard about the administration of God's grace that was given to me for you, that is, the mystery made known to me by revelation as I have already written briefly.*" (3:2, 3) NIV Paul had received a message from God and was told to preach it to the world. The letters we hold in our hands today contain God's special revelation to us.

To every Christian, the value of the New Testament letters is not monetary, but rather the immeasurable value in God's wisdom being shared with us!


