PASTOR'S CHAT

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well and blessed. I pray this New Year will bring you new happiness, new peace, new friends, and new exciting opportunities. Which is exactly what we seek each year as we shape our New Year's Resolution. As we enter 2014, I would like to suggest a New Year's Resolution for you. Make this your 2014 motto:

The greatest thing we can do in 2014 is take a risk!

Why is this such a beautiful motto for 2014? In my readings, I came across this quote from Max Lucado which answers that perfectly:

When fear shapes our lives, safety becomes our God. When safety becomes our God, we worship the risk-free life.

Can the safety lover do anything great? Can the risk-averse accomplish noble deeds? For God? For others?

No. The fear-filled life cannot love deeply because love is risky...No wonder Jesus wages such a war against fear.

Fear creates insecurities. Fear blocks action. Fear puts up walls and keeps people at a distance. Fear never trusts. Fear never accepts. Fear is always suspicious.

Love draws people in. Love allows people to be who they really are. Because love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. So take the risk:

Weep and risk appearing sentimental.

Reach out for another and risk involvement.

Expose your feelings and risk exposing your true self.

Place your ideas, your dreams, before a crowd and risk their loss.

Love and risk not being loved in return.

Live and risk dying.

Hope and risk despair.

Try and risk failure.

Because the greatest hazard in life is to risk nothing. The person who risks nothing, does nothing, has nothing, and is nothing. They may avoid suffering and sorrow, but they cannot learn, feel, change, grow, live or love.

A few years ago I heard this story of a ten year old boy. His brother was confined to a wheel chair, and he was pushing his brother around the Cabrini-Green Projects in Chicago. When suddenly the wheel chair hit a bump in the sidewalk, and his brother slipped out of the wheel chair.

The ten year old was not strong enough to lift his brother back into the wheel chair. He tried many times to flag down a car, to get someone who might help lift his brother back into the wheel chair. But no one stopped.

Finally, the ten year old picked up a brick, and he threw it at the next car, which just happened to be a brand new luxury Jaguar. The brick hit the front passenger window and shattered the glass. The wealthy business man in the car slammed on his breaks, jumped out of the car and gave this ten year old an ear full.

The ten year old apologized and told the man he just needed someone to stop and help his brother. The business man suddenly saw the paralyzed boy lying on the sidewalk. He helped the boy back into his wheel chair. For the rest of the year, the business man refused to repair the shattered window. To remind himself that drive bys in any neighborhood should never be tolerated.

And as I remember that story, I am confronted with many condemning questions: how many drive bys have I committed? People that just needed me to stop. How many people have I walked by at Walmart, at the park, even in this church? Probably too many. And I'm reminded of John's first letter, when he writes:

If anyone...sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him? Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue, but with actions and truth.

The battle is not taking place in the safety of this room. The battle is taking place out there in our own backyards. Drugs are destroying people's lives. Affairs are destroying marriages. So many children are living without the attention and affection they desperately need from their Moms and Dads.

What if we all decided, church wide that we were going to cut back on our activities, so we could serve in our youth ministry and our children's ministry. What if our homes became safe places for young people to come to? Giving them an alternative on Friday nights and Saturday nights. So they can experience that positive social environment and nurturing affection. What if we took that risk?

I read of a hotel in Singapore that introduced an express buffet – ‘Eat All You Can In 30 Minutes and Pay Just Half Price’ After that experience, one diner reported; “ I lost my decorum, stuffing my mouth with yet more food. I lost my civility.....and I lost my appetite for the rest of the day because my heartburn was so severe.”

Many of us begin new disciplines or make resolutions as we enter a new year. Often the discipline deals with spending more time in scripture or in prayer. I wonder how many times we treat our time with God as an ‘express buffet’? I know I am guilty of hurrying through my devotional time as if there was a time limit or because I had other things pulling my attention away. I wolf it down and wonder why I didn’t learn anything. Like physical food, spiritual food needs chewing! For those of us who have been Christians for a long time, may have a tendency to speed read passages that we think we have heard a thousand times or it seems boring. But in doing so, we miss what God is meaning to show us or to tell us. One sure sign of this is when we walk away from our devotional time and learn nothing new from the passage.

The Psalmist’s desire was right when he wrote in Psalm 119:15, *I will meditate on Your precepts and consider your ways*” That’s the way to treat God’s word – take time to mull it over.

Let’s not come to the Bible as if we were going to an express buffet. Only by meditating on God’s word will we get the most value for our spiritual well-being.

Here is a little poem that was printed in the Daily Bread that goes along with this thought:

Works in us a transformation




