Dear Friends,

I pray that you are well and blessed. I have been enjoying the beautiful spring weather we are having. Whenever the weather gets nice, I always start thinking about getting back into shape. I even spent a little bit of time this week looking into a gym membership. I have needed to lose a few pounds for a long time now. (No comments necessary!).

But a gym is a difficult place to go when you are looking to lose weight. Do you know what I mean? It seems like the people who go to the gym, are the men and women who really don't need to go to the gym. Most of the people in a health club are strong and fit and in shape and showing it off at every opportunity.

It's hard to be around those people when you are just getting started. Nothing acts as a greater hurdle to getting into shape as having to work around people who don't look like they have an ounce of fat on their perfectly sculpted bodies.

My experience at the health club has me reflecting on Levi son of Alphaeus. In Mark 2:13-17, Levi is introduced when Jesus meets him collecting taxes. And Jesus gives him a simple invitation, "follow me".

So Levi does. And later Levi throws a party for Jesus. But I imagine this was not the kind of party we have ever gone to, except for those of us who have been to college! This was a frat party.

While this is happening, the Pharisees and the Teachers of the Law begin to mutter. It is never good when people begin to mutter. They begin asking why Jesus would eat with sinners and tax collectors, people who have done something wrong.

Sinners are people who have become religious outcasts because they failed the "Love your God" test. Tax collectors were those who worked for the Roman government against their own people, and as a result, failed the "Love your Neighbor" test.

However, Jesus overhears their muttering, and in return, he responds with an illustration from the world of health care. He describes the healthy and the sick. In Jesus' analogy, the sick were the people who were willing to acknowledge their sin and their brokenness.

The healthy, and I don't know if Jesus was the type of guy who used air quotes, but you can almost sense the air quotes as he states the healthy. The healthy were people who were just as sinful as the sick, but weren't willing to acknowledge it. They were the ones who came thinking they were fine. Thinking they had it all taken care of. The sick were the honest people. The righteous were the ones who were in denial.

There is a hard lesson for us in those classifications as we look at this text. People who don't acknowledge their need for Jesus won't be able to experience him in a meaningful way. Sometimes we can live in denial. Or we try to compare ourselves to people who are not as healthy as ourselves. And we can say, "Well, at least I'm not like him."

It's easy to fall into that trap. We don't want to feel ashamed. We don't want to feel embarrassed. We don't want to face our imperfections. But Jesus makes it clear, if we don't confront our brokenness, our hurt, our needs, we will never discover the fullness of His redemption power. And we miss out on what the community of faith in Jesus Christ has to offer.

And it has me wondering, when we come to this Church, do we see it as a health club or a hospital?

Do you come to Church to show off how healthy, and fine, and perfect you are? It is a place you come to show your spiritual fitness and strength?

Or is this a place you can lay it all down at the altar? Do you come to the presence of Christ, admitting your need for Him and his redemption power? Do you come to your brothers and sisters in Christ, admitting your need to be lifted up to Him?

When you picture the Church, do you picture it as a health club or as a hospital?

I think what Jesus is getting at is this needs to be a hospital. It is place we can come and bring whatever wounds us or hurts us or holds us back so we can experience the fullness of his redemption.

My prayer for all of us, individually, and as a community of faith, is that we will come into this place without pretext or pretending, into the arms of Jesus Christ, the one who loves us and saves us and promises us everything we need.

LAY LEADER'S LINE

My two year old grand-daughter, Madison, loves to have my wife and I sit on the floor with her and help her stack all of her over-sized Lego blocks on top of each other until we have used them all. We will meticulously snap the pieces together until the structure stands three to four foot tall. After Linda and I spend all of this time to get the blocks just right, Madison gives us a sly grin and hits the tower to knock all of the pieces on the floor. She then starts clapping and says, "Yeah!" and then the process starts all over.

This exercise in futility started me thinking how this activity is a lot like our adult life. Some of us will spend our lifetime creating a home, family, financial security, only to see it all fall apart by losing our jobs, getting a divorce, stock market crash, or death. What is our reaction to such things? Do we 'melt into mental –madness'? Do we go into a red-faced relentless rage? Or do we smile, clap and say yeah?

Of course, I'm just speaking metaphorically about the clapping and saying "yeah", but to me Madison's reaction would indicate that we don't put 'things' ahead of eternity.

I am reminded of the rich young ruler in Matthew 19:16-22, who asked Jesus what he must do to have eternal life. Jesus responded in verse 21 (paraphrased); "Sell all you have and follow me" I'm also reminded of the two parables in chapter 13 of Matthew about the hidden treasure and the pearl merchant in which both of the men in the parables sold all they had for the valuable thing they found.

Is Jesus telling us that all believers must sell everything they own in order to have eternal life? I don't think so. My footnote in the Life Application Bible puts it this way: We are responsible to care for our own needs and the needs of our families so as to not be a burden on others. We should, however be willing to give up anything if God asks us to do so. This kind of attitude allows nothing to come between us and God and keeps us from using our God-given wealth selfishly. If you are comforted by the fact that Christ did not tell all his followers to sell all their possessions, then you may be too attached to what you have!

We should go through each day thankful for what we have and be willing to offer anything and everything to further God's Kingdom. Maybe this is why Jesus told the disciples after they were trying to keep the children away from Him, said "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to <u>such as these."</u> Matt. 19:14

Madison has the right perspective. Don't let what you build up in your lifetime become a barrier between you and God.




