
Jumpin' 4 Jesus

30-HOUR FAMINE EVENT ... COMING SOON!

All youth, Middle School and High School, mark your calendars and plan to participate in the 30-Hour Famine event, March 18-19, 2011, at Otterbein UMC. Plan to arrive at the church at 6:00 pm on Friday; pickup at the church will be 6:00 pm on Saturday! If you didn't already pick up a fundraising packet at the Feb 16th LinC meeting, then be sure to get one from the Welcome Center table at church.

Over the next few weeks, our youth will come face to face with the realities of poverty and injustice. They'll learn about—and experience—hunger for themselves. Most of all, they'll get to do something about it: raising money to help feed and care for hungry kids. Here's how it works through World Vision: It takes \$1.00/day, or \$30/month, to help feed and care for one child. The youth at LinC on Feb 16th set as their personal **goal to raise \$360**, which will help to feed and care for one child for one year! You can help the youth in this effort with your prayers and monetary support. **Youth will begin their "fast" starting after lunch on Friday, March 18th**, and will have only water and fruit juices for the next 30 hrs. The total dollar amount raised to feed and care for a child (i.e. "Andinette" who we support on an ongoing basis) will be determined by the end of the event.

Meet Joan Hutton...

(Special thanks to Sandy and Kenny Smallhorn for this fascinating article about one of Otterbein's special members!!)

Joan Hutton was born in Uluberia, India in April 1921. Uluberia is southwest of Calcutta. Her parents were Baptist missionaries. She lived there until she was almost four years old. She recalls many interesting times her family had while living there.

One day her sister Barbara was playing in the sand outside their home. She had always loved things that wiggled and bugs. Looking out, her mother saw Barbara playing with something in the sand so she went out to see what creature had her daughter so captivated. To her horror, she saw it was a baby Cobra!

Their home was on the second floor. It was built on stilts to accommodate the monsoon season. There was a railing around the porch of their home. On this particular day, the neighbor boy, Barbara and Joan were playing on the porch when they saw a monkey sitting on the railing. They started to tease it. It became agitated and started to chase Joan and the boy. Fearful it would bite the children or scratch them, the boy's father had a gun and shot the monkey, killing it. Joan recalled how this really set the missionary work back because the natives believed in reincarnation!

They only had one well to use. It served as their bath tub, laundry facility and their kitchen faucet. All of their drinking water was boiled. They used mosquito nets even back then because of the malaria the mosquitoes carried. Joan knows first-hand about malaria since she contracted it at age 3 ½.

But the most fascinating thing is, her father and GANDHI were close friends! He visited her father often at their home. Even after returning home to the United States, Gandhi continued to write to her father. If you were to read about Gandhi, you would read about a hand held sewing machine Gandhi used. It is mentioned that a missionary gave him the sewing machine. That missionary was Joan's father.

Gandhi had shared with her father that he believed in the Christian ethics. He said he would proclaim he was a Christian but what stopped him was the Christians he had previously met. She said he had a great influence on her father as well as her father had on Gandhi. Joan recalls seeing Gandhi walking away from their home carrying the sewing machine on his back. Her sister Barbara had the letters Gandhi had written their father. When she died, Joan doesn't know what happened to those letters.

She and her family returned back to the United States when she was three almost four years old. Joan had malaria at the time. It was overwhelming for her mother so Joan lived in Ohio with her grandmother upon their return until she was ten years old.

Her father was a minister during the depression. Therefore they didn't live anywhere for a very long stretch. She recalled living on the south side of Chicago. Her father was paid \$5.00 a month. To make ends meet, he had to take on another job as well. Yet she said he never shirked his duties as a pastor. He was there when someone was sick, needed help or just needed prayer. She said that a Baptist minister was called upon to be a minister and usually wasn't as formally educated, thus they took their ministry as just that, a ministry. It was not just a job for them. They were very committed to their congregation.

With times being so hard on everyone, she talked of the toys she and her sister played with. They took catalogs and cut the people out. Then they would "shop" for new clothes for them by cutting out other outfits for them. They would cut out families and play with their paper dolls using only their catalog families and their imagination.

Joan joined her father's church when she was 10 years old, around 1931. In this particular congregation, they had a melting pot of nationalities. There were Mexican, Polish, German, and Italian people attending their church. Many times church would be held in a local forest preserve where it was turned into a family potluck picnic. That sounds more Methodist than Baptist to me!

Joan talked briefly about dating back then. She said it was VERY structured. She said she didn't have many dates because she was considered by her peers as too prim and proper. After all, she was a preacher's child.

She met her first and only true love while attending EIU. After graduation, she married him. His name was Jim Hutton. He was the football coach at small schools. He would bring them from a losing team to a winning team for three or four years in a row before moving on. She tells how Jim was a star quarterback for EIU. Problem was, back then they wore leather helmets. Later in his life, this became the source of some brain damage he suffered prior to his death.

Jim was definitely called to become a minister. She laughs and said he didn't go willingly! She saw him in the living room floor wrestling with who he said was God. This went on for a short while. Jim was arguing with God that he was not minister material! God won and so Jim went to seminary in Chicago and later transferred to Indianapolis.

As a pastor's wife, she found life to be lonely. She never made friends because in her way of thinking, friendship would mean she had favorites. She just couldn't single any certain person out to be friends with. She never had a friend until Jim retired. Her first friend was a Catholic woman who lived across the trailer from her. They were very close!

As a Christian, she said her greatest memory was when her own children joined the church. She felt that they had done something right as parents when their children wanted to join the church.

Joan and Jim had five children, four boys and one girl. Jim Jr. went on to be a minister himself. So Joan lived her life as a pastor's daughter, a pastor's wife and a pastor's mother. To my way of thinking, Joan has truly been blessed!
