IT IS GOOD TO BE AMONG THE UPRIGHT AND MOBILE AGAIN. While the healing of the broken hip suffered in January is still tiring and taking place, I am able to get around without the walker or the cane. Thanks so much for your prayers, patience and many kindnesses. I hope you have all felt connected as I have been working from the parsonage. It is my office at home.

ON A SNOWY COLD DAY IN FEBRUARY, Linda and I drove Route 16 to Shelbyville and back. Linda was driving so I could check out the windy, weather and God's beautiful, but cold, winter artistry. One thing that I noticed was the way the snow raced across the semi-cleared road creating an actual road hazard some places and at other places there was no snow coming anywhere the road.

ROUTE 16 BETWEEN COLES AND SHELBY COUNTY, is flatter than a pancake griddle with few trees near the road. So why was there snow some places and not others? I watched carefully to solve this seasonal mystery. The answer was surprisingly obvious. The snow blown sections of the road ran past harvested soy bean fields with virtually nothing of any height left on the fields. The clear sections of the road were next to harvested cornfields that had acres of short, stalk, stubble sticking up no more than two or three inches, but together it was more than enough to slow down the wind and catch the snow, trapping the precipitation for warmer weather when it would melt into the soil.

OTTERBEIN UMC is a lot like the harvested cornfields. We aren't very big, but when we stand together doing what God has called us to do, we can make a big difference. We can slow down the winds that drive people away from God. We can provide a safe place, away from the dangers of life's roads, for people who are blown from pillar to post and away again.

GOD USES US IN MANY WAYS THAT WE DON'T EVEN realize even in the dead of winter. We can be part of God's plan if we just stand together supporting the efforts of each other to grow and find God' mission and purpose for our own lives and the life of God's congregation at Otterbein UMC.

Sight and Soul for Nicaragua 2015



Greetings!

Hopefully this New Year is finding you well! I wanted to write to you about an opportunity to serve the Lord! As you may already know, I am a second year optometry student and member of Fellowship of Christian Optometrists at Southern College of Optometry. Each year FCO takes a missions trip to an underserved part of the world to provide free eye care, glasses, medications, and God's love to those people who so desperately need it. Last year, twenty-eight students traveled to Les Cayes, Haiti, and in three days, over 800 people's lives were reached with our eye care, free glasses, eye drops, and prayer.

This May FCO is traveling to Nicaragua from the 9th-15th. We will be partnering with Chosen Children Ministries and the local churches at our destination. Our main goal is to share the love of Christ through optometry and children's ministry to the people of Nicaragua. These people do not have routine eye care, and some of them have never seen an optometrist. We will have thirty-one students, five family members, and three staff doctors, Dr. Richard Savoy, Dr. Janet Dumas, and Dr. Benjamin Brenner, traveling with us on the trip. As May draws near, we and the local pastors of Nicaragua grow more excited about the amazing things God is orchestrating. We will spend many hours collecting/sorting/cleaning donated glasses and making glasses for the people of Nicaragua. There will be many fundraisers such as bake sales, silent auctions, luncheons and Chik-Fil-A breakfasts. We also have been preparing our hearts and minds with Bible studies and serving breakfast for the homeless people of Memphis. I am extremely excited and honored to be a part of the mission team this year.

We know that God will provide for us, but we still need your support. First of all, I/we need prayer! The difference between FCO and other humanitarian eye care organizations is that our primary focus is sharing Jesus. God's love is the reason why we are going, and optometry is the means through which we are sharing His love. Pray that God will use our words and actions to reflect the love of Jesus Christ to the people of Nicaragua. Secondly, I/we need financial support. The cost of the trip is \$1525 per person. With 39 people going, the total cost of the trip is just under \$60,000! This is a big number for college students, but with God no mountain is too high!

I would be extremely excited and honored if you partner with me on FCO's 2015 Mission trip to Nicaragua!! If you feel led, checks can be made payable to "SCO-FCO". As an added incentive, your donation will be tax deductible.

If you would like to make your donation tax deductible, please let me know, and I will provide you with the necessary form. Place my name on the "memo" line on the check to ensure your donation will be used to cover my expenses, while any extra money will go to support others on the trip. Donations need to be in by March 20, 2015.




