




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PASTOR'S CHAT

THE BEGINNING OF THE HOLIDAY SUPPER

My Father, Edmund Gilbert, loved the Otterbein Church family. In 1981, he wanted to start having a Church Family Holiday Supper between Thanksgiving and Christmas, representing both Holidays. He volunteered to buy the turkeys and my Mom, Helen Gilbert, and myself volunteered to cook them. It was decided to have the supper the first Sunday in December each year. So, on Sunday, December 6, 1981 at 5:30 p.m. was the beginning of the Holiday Suppers. My Father only enjoyed it for one year as the following May 14, 1982 he passed away. However, my Mother and I continued the tradition for several years of buying and cooking the turkeys and bringing noodles. Also, other women joined in with cooking the turkeys, noodles and supplying a ham. Following the supper everyone enjoyed visiting, singing carols and closing with candlelight and singing Silent Night. Other activities have been added along with another way of supplying the turkeys to the evening of enjoyment, but the same tradition continues. Also, Wayne Cox Sr. had smoked some turkeys, which were very delicious. There are many names that could be added to the list of contributors and workers of these suppers and we don't want to forget them.

I guess I need to tell one interesting thing that happened. Bill and I do not remember what year it happened, but we got to the Church and low and behold the cooked turkeys were still at home. So, Bill made a flying trip back to the house, which was approximately seven miles one way, to rescue the turkeys.

Also, another fact is I brought chocolate lush to the Holiday Suppers in the beginning, and now I don't think I would be able to enter the Church without bringing it.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

Some of you may ask the question, "Just what is Annual Conference?" and "Who attends it?" and "What takes place there?"

Annual Conference, June 6-9, was held in Peoria. Each church in the Illinois Great Rivers Conference can send one lay delegate for each assigned pastor. It definitely is not a vacation by any means. There is church business to be conducted. But there are several times of great worship scheduled throughout the four-day conference for all the lay delegates and pastors. There are times for casually renewing acquaintances and relationships from times gone by. I even made a few new friends.

I was asked to attend the conference this year as the alternate delegate from Otterbein.

Some of the necessary business that needs to be taken care of included approval of various reports and decision on several issues presented for action. We decided on a Conference Budget, Pastors' Pension, Compensation and Health Care guidelines and Nominations to fill all the Conference committees. Unfortunately, we were asked to approve the closing of a few struggling churches in the Conference.

Between sessions, various agencies and vendors displayed resources, some free and some for purchase, that can be used to enhance ministry in the local church.

It was good to see again Pastor Krista Price and Pastor Sharon (and Ron) Monroe. I even got to see again a good friend, who I taught Sunday School in Ohio and who is now a pastor in Havana, IL. His father was my pastor in our church in Ohio.

I cannot deny that it was fun searching out good restaurants where we could enjoy food and fellowship. Of course, this was during our free time.

One highlight was the Service of Commissioning and Ordination. Pastor Nick was commissioned as a provisional member for ordination as elder. I was happy to be there to support him.

It was a good experience to get acquainted with the governing process of the IGRC. Best of all was the uplifting worship times. The Conference speaker, Jorge Acevedo, was very inspiring. Bishop Palmer preached (Morning Manna) each day. Who wasn't encouraged and challenged to go back to our individual churches and be the church?

<u>Inspiration</u>: Some time ago, I learned in a Bible study "to watch for where God is at work and join Him there"... instead of starting ministries and asking God to bless them. There is nothing more exciting than to watch people serving the Lord doing what they love to do and what God has created them to do! Let us "watch together" for where we "see God at work, so we can join Him there!"

A few ideas already mentioned:

- **Crafts & Sewing** (making projects for cancer patients, shut-ins, and the annual bazaar—for starters, the women are hoping to work together on this project at the Weds Family Nights!
- **Book Clubs** (setting up a church library to be used by adults and kids... library coming soon!)
- Tutoring (helping kids & adults with reading, math, etc.)
- Visitation's Group (made up of younger and older folks)
- Gardening Group (to help with church landscaping; plant vegetable or flower gardens)
- **Drama Group** (Skits, musicals, drama dinner theatres)
- **Fellowship Groups** (church folks getting together with other church folks in the home)
- Community Volunteering (i.e. "Standing Stone" Community Center)
 - ...and on and on!!! The sky is the limit, so let's DREAM BIG together!!

Next Steps: See me if you would like to become a part of one of the groups already mentioned above, or a ministry that hasn't even been thought of yet! I will try to help you to get started, or to get connected! Then, periodically, I hope to report in a spot in the church newsletter what's happening... The Otterbein Hubbub!

Otterbein Mission Trip

(June 3 through June 9, 2012)

AMAZING! LED BY GOD! EYE OPENING! MOTIVATING! LIFE CHANGING! These are phrases used by the mission team to describe our trip. The team was made up of Sean & Austin Hackett, Alesia Smyser, Mackenzie Wilson, Kenny Smallhorn, Debra Bircher, Seleny Garcia, Brianna Bensley, and Drew Borzi with Pastor Nick, Sandy Smallhorn, Shelli Blair and Dan Bircher as chaperones. We traveled to the streets (I literally mean the streets) of Chicago.

Each day we would get up between 7-8a.m. and have breakfast "at home". From 8-8:15 we were led in a devotion by the pastor or one of the chaperones. Then our CSM leader Taylor would meet up with us and put us to work. Everyone laughed at my description of Taylor. I described her as oozing with God's love. She was a great role model even for the older kids on the trip like me. Her compassion and love were always present.

Each day held a special meaning for all of us. We went to a YMCA in a primarily Latino area. Here we worked with preschoolers. On the door leading into the school part there was a sign saying, "No weapons allowed." Wow! Dan got a free and unwanted hair cut from what started out as a pretend barber. They tipped a pot over his head and switched to real scissors and cut his hair. Pastor sat on the floor with the kids and read books. Kenny played hard with the kids on the playground and much to his surprise he found out they never got tired of chasing him. Alesia and Mackenzie made buddies for life.

We went to the streets of downtown Chicago where we were given \$10 and told to find someone in need and spend our money on a way to help them. Little did we know how potentially dangerous this was. Yet God blessed each of us and showed us not only how to help but how to be compassionate at the same time. All of us had to step out of our comfort zone and overcome some personal fears, but we all did it and found out how mind blowing this experience was.

We climbed six flights of stairs to clean up a free clothing store. We served dinner to homeless patrons and even cooked a meal for the clients at the homeless shelter. We were blessed to be able to unload the truck at a food pantry and help sort the food. At every stop we found ourselves surrounded by the greatest people we could have hoped to meet.

Every one of us found how blessed we are and how much more blessed we became after talking and meeting these fabulous people. Their lives were just like ours until circumstances or environment interfered. Some had lived a much more productive life than we have but something happened to shatter their lives. We saw more respect for each other and for our "team" than you could even have hoped for. How humbling when you come to make their lives a little brighter, and they put our needs above theirs. We were told to show them respect because the average person passes them by and judges them in their mind without knowing their story. We discovered we as a group collectively did the same thing. Challenging our preconceived opinions turned our lives upside down. By the end of the week everything we thought we knew about the homeless had changed.

We played Bingo with the nursing home residents. For some who had never been exposed to the elderly or mentally challenged found this to be quite frightening. Some were able to overcome their fears and ended up having a blast! There again we were treated like royalty.

The most frightening part of our trip was spent in Englewood. We helped at a school that was open for the kids who wanted to be there in order to stay off the streets. It was a Christian setting. Due to our pampered lives we all were in shock at what little there was available to these children. Their disrespect for the "school rules" we know was shocking. Yet these teachers work from 8am until 7pm to provide a safe setting for these children from the ghetto. These teachers amazingly find rewards in the smallest of ways. If the child shows up, since it is a voluntary basis is a reward. Maybe a child learns to read on a much lower level than their age it is rewarding. There are no apples brought to the show the students' appreciation. No gifts at Christmas. Just an occasional smile or an unexpected thank you confirmed progress.

As a team we learned how to tolerate annoying noises, comfort and be there for each other, and to appreciate each difference and skill of our fellow team member. We learned to laugh together, cry together, protect each other and love each other. As far as team leaders, there was no need for one individual to take control. Where one fell short, the other led. What an AWESOME experience.

Each night we had a "debriefing" where we discussed the events of the day. The general consensus was how naïve and blessed we were. Some said they thought life had dealt them a dirty deal, and they had nothing. However after this trip they really feel they have too much. Each of us felt we grew closer to God and learned a deeper appreciation for his great works. We all came home excited and ready to learn how to help in our own community. Thank you, Otterbein, for giving us this opportunity to grow spiritually. Spending time with the homeless and less fortunate allowed each of us to experience a deeper relationship with God.


